#### A. Island of Dolls, Mexico

Deep in the verdant waterways of Xochimilco near Mexico City lies a small island with a history that chills to the bone. #### C. The Gum Wall, Seattle

Adjacent to the box office for Seattle's Market Theater, this colourful wall covered with used chewing gum is a quirky testament to spontaneous urban art.
